

Wild Bird Cover

Wild bird cover is a GLAS action where farmers plant cereals and kale to support birds whose habitat has been compromised by farming.

Bees, insects, birds and wild small mammal populations are in decline because of the destruction of their natural habitat as a result of modern farming practices.

Wild bird cover is a GLAS action whereby farmers cultivate the plants which support native flora and fauna.

Seed-eating birds are in decline because of intensive farming and crop specialisation, which deprives them of the variety that they need in their diet.

Seed-eating birds like the yellowhammer need large cereal seeds and the linnet needs small seeds, such as linseed or kale.

Wild bird cover is a giant food table for wild birds whose habitat has been undermined

The flowers in wild bird cover attract insects, birds and bats feed on the insects and worms.

Wild bird cover provides cover for small mammals. Birds of prey use wild bird covers as a hunting ground to feed on small animals.



Oats & Linseed Wild Bird Cover mix is to be re-sown annually by the 31st May each year. The Wild Bird cover area must be shockproof fenced although livestock can enter the Wild Bird Cover area from the 15th of March to help clear the area of trash before the mix is to be re-sown before the 31st of May.

'Kale'

Another Wild Bird Cover planting option under GLAS is planting a crop of Kale bi-annually along with a annual cereal option.

In a field where Kale and cereals are planted the plot is to be split in two, to allow ease of access to re-sow the cereals annually

The wild bird cover must be planted by May 31 each year except for Kale which is planted every 2 years and left in situ until March 15.

The GLAS payment is €900 per hectare per annum.

Approximately 11,000 farmers choose the Wild Bird Cover option on there GLAS plans, planting close to 20,000Ha of Wild Bird Cover
